Bob Gerrity is the University Librarian at Monash University. Prior to his appointment at Monash in March 2018, Bob was the University Librarian at the University of Queensland (2012-2017). Earlier he spent 19 years in technology leadership positions at the Boston Public Library and the Boston College Libraries. Bob is particularly interested in the application of current and emerging technologies to ensure that library collections, spaces, and services remain relevant in the digital environment and deliver the greatest possible benefit to Monash students, academics, and researchers. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the Council of Australian University Librarians (CAUL) and the Libraries Australia Advisory Committee (LAAC), and several library industry advisory boards.

Rod Rizzi is the Acting Library Manager of the Monash University Caulfield Library. Previous to this, he has also acted in the role of Subject Librarian for the Arts Faculty, while his substantive position has been the Information and Lending Services Coordinator since 2009. He was heavily involved, alongside John Wardle Architects and builders Hansen Yuncken, in the planning, design and staging processes for the major refurbishment of the Caulfield Library. This was completed in mid-2017. With a focus on the user experience, Rod is keen to see areas designed and built that are fit for purpose and flexible enough to cater for the varying demands of a modern teaching and learning environment.

**Sue Owen** is Director, Library and Learning Spaces, Federation University Australia. She is skilled in strategic planning and evidence-based development; information access and digital literacy for all; corporate communications and community engagement; and purposeful and empowering leadership. Sue graduated from La Trobe University, RMIT and the University of New South Wales and has worked in five academic libraries, three corporate research libraries and in private industry. Her record of achievement is well captured in the phrase: nothing ventured, nothing gained!









**Jennifer Murphy** is the Educational Services Librarian at Victoria University where she provides leadership, innovation and expertise in the development of library and information services to support the University's learning and teaching activities. She has worked in the academic library sector for 10 years. She is interested in the connections between teaching and research, and how collaborations within institutions lead to a positive environment for students.

**Kerry Bedford** Associate Director, Library Client Services Australian Catholic University. She is leads the six campus libraries (located in Brisbane, North Sydney, Strathfield, Canberra, Melbourne and Ballarat) and the programs they provide that support learning and teaching and research at ACU. Kerry has previously worked at UNSW Library, Monash University Library, Union College Library, Curtin University Library and UWA Library.

**Dr Trent Hennessey,** Learning and Teaching Coordinator, the University of Melbourne Library. Trent works with a team of librarians to deliver the library's scholarly and digital literacies program, which reaches more than 45,000 students across the University each year. Before joining the library, Trent worked in academic teaching and research roles within business faculties, and has a professional background in marketing and communications.

**Debbie Leatham**, Information Librarian, Federation University Australia has worked in academic libraries for over 20 years following an early career as a secondary school teacher. Previously at Monash University and now Federation University Australia, Churchill Gippsland, Debbie has supported and collaborated with teaching staff in the Education and Art Faculties. Debbie loves being in the classroom and teaching students and academics how to get what they need from the Library.









Clare Duffy, Liaison librarian, Federation University Australia has recently completed postgraduate qualifications in Library and Information management. Her role as Liaison Librarian for Business, Science, IT and Engineering draws from extensive corporate and government experience in Business, Marketing and Human Resources. Clare was also a sessional teacher at TAFE for 8 years, gaining valuable experience in engaging with students on a practical level. Evaluating the impact of Library Skills classes has been a key focus of Clare and Debbie's work over the last year, with the ultimate aim of improving student engagement, retention and success at university.

Louise Dick, Manager Academic Services, CAVAL has worked in and with libraries for over 15 years, after gaining her Masters in Librarianship from Sheffield University, and when she wasn't working, Louise was travelling overseas – spending several months in a Sri Lankan public library where she volunteered after the tsunami. She is currently supporting and developing the JUSP service, in partnership with Jisc in the UK, coordinating a pilot of their Institutional Repository Usage Statistics portal, and exploring more ways that CAVAL can collaborate and innovate.
