Databases

Core Arts and Humanities databases (try these first):

The databases below are multidisciplinary so you can expect lots of results from different subject areas.

Discovery (EBSCO)

Use Discovery to look for books, ebooks, journal articles and more. It's a great place to start your search but does not give you everything the Library has. We highly recommend searching in at least one other database on this list as well as Discovery.

Google Scholar

Google Scholar is one of the most popular ways to find academic sources for study and research. Did you know you can use it to search for journal articles that the University of Melbourne has access to? You can do this through the link above or set up your Google Scholar preferences to include Library content.

• JSTOR (ITHAKA)

JSTOR is one of the largest databases the Library has access to. It is a multidiscipli over a hundred subjects - many of them related to arts and humanities. Highly recor

Scopus (Elsevier)

Scopus is another large, multidisciplinary database. It looks through journals, books that can help you discover new research quickly - the 'times cited' and 'related article have full-text PDFs it is still an excellent place to look for your research.
